religion cohere together.

Exceptional independence; the ability to think for themselves and take the initiative in, for example, asking questions, carrying out investigations, evaluating ideas and working constructively with others.

Significant levels of originality, imagination or creativity, which are shown in their

responses to their learning in RE.

 The ability to link the study of religion and belief to personal reflections on meaning and purpose.

A wide knowledge and deep understanding across a wide range of religions and beliefs.
